To the Community,

As we come to the conclusion of this school year, I proudly present to you the Rural Virtual Academy Charter School Inc. (RVA) performance benchmarks in this annual performance report. As you will read, nearly all indications, including fiscal performance, satisfaction ratings, academic outcomes, and flexible learning opportunities, combined with collaborative partnership agreements between public school entities, are positive. After 17 years of operation, the RVA continues to prove to be a successful model in the evolving landscape of education throughout the State of Wisconsin and beyond. After nearly two decades, it is abundantly clear to me what makes this school and its operations remain steadfast in regularly obtaining enduring achievement and success. It can be attributed to the long-term, trusting, and positive relationships built between the staff and the students, families, and communities we have the privilege to serve.

The “R” in RVA stands for “Rural” but we believe it also stands for “Relationships.” Building these relationships is at the core foundational mission of the RVA and the excellence that every employee of the school is upheld to meet. It is the first letter in our school’s name because it is most important. It is the foundation on which we are built. We believe that every person we meet is part of our

extended family and we are to treat them all as such. These relationships are the reason parents continue to stay and make the RVA their family's school of choice for the duration of their children's primary and secondary education. In addition, this sense of family in the RVA leads to the majority of our new families who join us to have been referred by existing RVA families as made evident in our fall survey year after year. It is the reason school districts continue to collaboratively join together with the RVA, forming Wisconsin's largest public school consortium. This consortium growth is the reason educational services that the RVA provides to school districts also continues to expand. Relationships are the reason the RVA continues to attract only the best teachers and support staff willing to lead and sacrifice in service to the greater good. I am proud of the willingness of everyone involved who dedicate the energy needed to sustain these relationships over the years. Without the positive relationships the RVA has with the Medford Board of Education, RVA Governance Board, consortium administration, Department of Public Instruction, Wisconsin eSchool Network, and most importantly that of our students and families, none of this would either be possible or sustainable. For these relationships, I am personally grateful and indebted.

The "V" in RVA stands for "Virtual" but in our mission we believe it also stands for "Values." Values are not only the measure of personal convictions and principles, but are also the measure of regard others have of our worth and merit. It is part of our mission to help instill and reinforce values, which ensure personal success in every person with whom we are connected. We

must measure our individual and school performance based on the positive values we impart into the lives of our students, families, and communities. This value can be measured financially and academically, but most importantly, I believe it is demonstrated through the voices of our students, families, and partners. This year's performance report shows indications of excellent financial health, academic successes including a perfect ACT score, 100% graduation rate, and school population growth. Even more, the end-of-year satisfaction survey shows positive results. Annually, the RVA provides a satisfaction survey to all parents in grades PreK-12 and to all students in grades 6-12. Participants are asked to rate the services of the school using an "A-F" rating scale. Every administrator, director, coordinator, and teacher are also individually subjected to this rating and the parents and students who complete the survey remain anonymous to the directors, teachers, and public. This level of customer scrutiny is uncommon in traditional school systems, but it is a practice that has been in place at the RVA dating back over 16 years. Out of the hundreds of surveys returned, the cumulative grade point average of all 82 individuals was a 3.74. This is the same as saying that 94% of scores were an "A." This score was identical to last year and has been the average score of our staff since we began surveying 16 years ago. This means that as our school, consortium, and services continue to grow and evolve the quality of our offerings as measured by students and parents has not declined. We are committed to maintaining this excellence. Our families who support us directly through their hard earned tax dollars deserve to

have only the highest quality value of educational opportunities afforded to their children. Likewise, our partner districts deserve to have the utmost value provided to their teachers and schools through our exceptional digital learning opportunities, professional development, and instructional services. Last, our students deserve to be instructed on how to be successful in life beyond basic academics. We must continue to practice teaching our students the value of hard work, dedication, and perseverance which is only possible when the teachers and leadership of any school are only of the highest

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caliber. You have to look no further than the comments and testimonials provided to our staff included in the Annual Report to gauge the perceived exemplary value of our school.

As a school, this is the heartbeat of our

for nothing less. The measuring of academic outcomes are attempted to be measured by legislatures and politicians in numerous objective ways. Most commonly and least reliably are the test scores imposed upon students who choose to partake in annual standardized examinations. Although these test scores show that RVA students perform at or above expectations in most categories, what they neglect to show accurately is the growth children made in their confidence and love of learning. Unlike traditional school settings, the RVA is able to personalize

the curricular and instructional options for each child to meet their individual needs in both level and in learning style. Parents can choose between independent self-guided learning options, parent-teacher collaborative book-based curriculums, and those directed by teachers on a daily basis. Curriculum placements are based on each child's growth and academic performance ensuring each child is being appropriately challenged and not being arbitrarily placed in an academic level based on age. Over one third of RVA high school students participate in collegiate leveled courses, work study programs, youth apprenticeships, or academic enrichment programs within brick and mortar buildings. Graduation rates continue to maintain at 100% and parent satisfaction over academic outcomes remains impressively high.

As you page through the remainder of this report, while gauging the performance of the school, keep in mind the ability the RVA has to continue to fulfill its mission to the public. Without question, I am proud to represent the embodiment of this organization and its relentless commitment to be the best in every facet of its operations.

In closing, I would first like to thank the Medford Area Public School District's Board of Education for their continued support and authorization of the RVA. Without their support and fiscal agency, we would not have been able to start, much less thrive, in this learning space. Second, I would like to thank the RVA Governance Board. Our board guides the mission of the school providing direction as we continue to navigate along

uncharted pathways. I appreciate the calculated risks our Board allows us to take, and the high standards they hold, by which we are expected to perform. Third, thank you to the administrators and staff from within our consortium school districts. - provide the highest quality academic options and support available to all students, families, and districts for whom we have the privilege to serve.

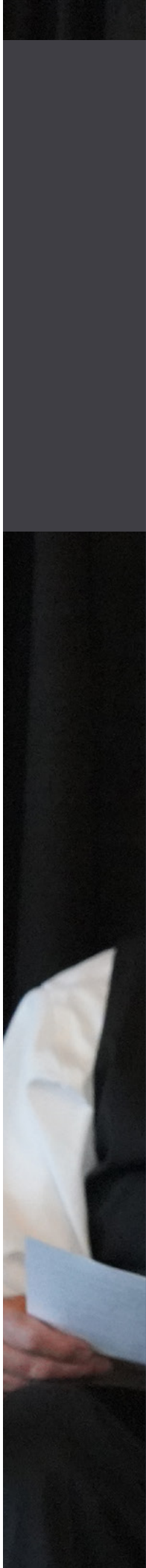


Our mission is illustrated through our school's mascot. 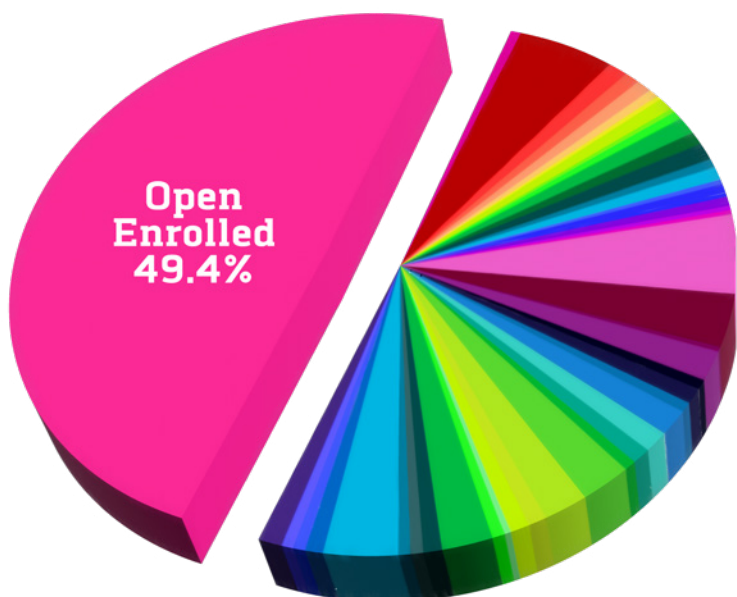

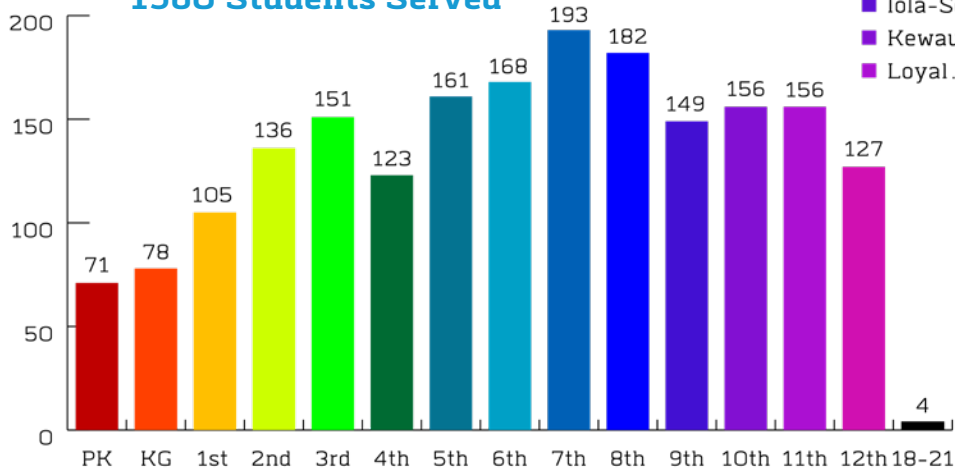

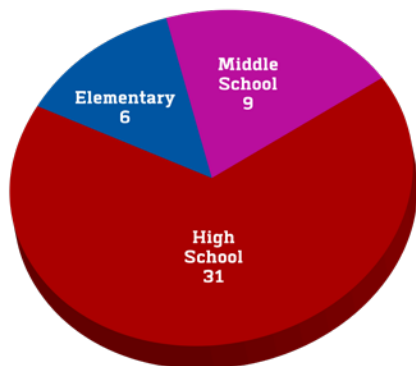
ENTRY/ WITHDRAWAL

Every student who attends the RVA enters the school through parental choice. There are no students placed into the RVA by school districts. The RVA is a year-round school, permitting students to enter the school at any time of the year, pending it is in their best interest and within the allowable enrollment periods determined by the Department of Public Instruction. Students can also transfer out of the RVA at any point in the school year. At times, the flexibility and accountability of the RVA does not make a good

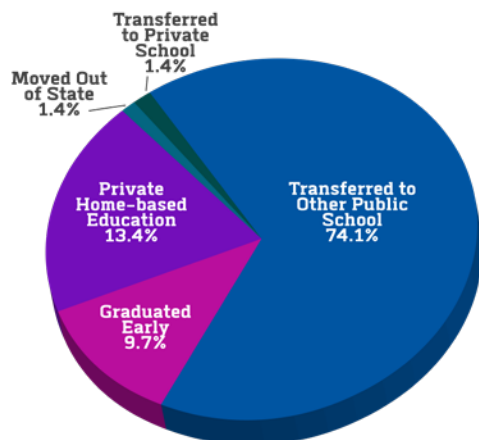
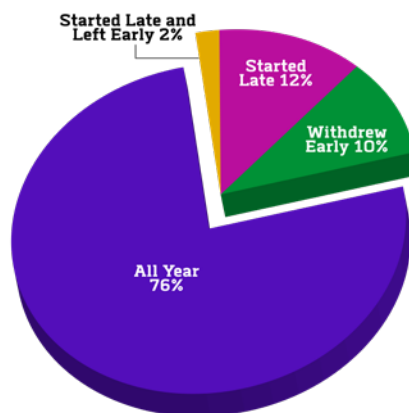
match for students. Wisconsin Statute 118.40(8)(g) requires public virtual charter schools to remand students back to their resident districts if students demonstrate a “failure to participate” to an assignment or other teacher directive, three times in a semester. This helps ensure that students who are provided the privilege to attend a virtual charter school, like the RVA, demonstrate the appropriate levels of responsibility necessary to make this form of education a successful opportunity.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Students enrolled in the RVA are provided by law, with special education services to meet their individual needs, just as if they were enrolled in any other public school. The RVA, under the authorization of the Medford Area Public School District, retains the legal responsibility to meet all special education and related service needs provided by the State of Wisconsin Statute 115.787 other than for those students residing within their consortium.

RVA Director of Special Education and Pupil Services, Kathy Alexander, and District Connect Director of Special Education, Sam Penry, noted that in the 2021-22 school year, 282 students in special education made up roughly 17% of the Rural Virtual Academy total student body. This percentage has remained consistent over the past several years. The students with special needs represent a wide variety of disabilities with some only requiring very limited therapy services while others require fully-adapted curricular and instructional options to meet their needs.

This year, many students with special needs remained on the RVA enrollment waitlist. We recognize the increasing need for high-quality, virtual education options for special education students in Wisconsin. In response, the RVA has hired three additional full-time special education teachers, to meet this need.

The goal of any academic intervention program is to catch learning deficits early enough so that they can potentially be corrected

and thus avoid the need for special education services altogether.

The RVA Academic Intervention Program will expand in the 2022-23 school year from one and one-half teachers to two full-time teachers. These specialists will continue to develop and implement academic intervention programming to assist children who struggle with learning basic skills but do not meet the criteria for special education services.

The RVA's special education department currently consists of 18 full-time staff and continues to grow at a steady rate while remaining cognizant of providing the highest quality program and services to our families. Our special education staff enhanced small group services with the expansion of live instruction and plans to provide more live group instruction as the team of professionals grows.

The RVA continues to provide and grow the 18-21-year-old virtual special education program. This program specializes in helping young adults with disabilities continue to improve their academic, functional, and vocational skills. The special education teacher in this program works with families to ensure these young adults are working to be as independent as possible in their home, community, and vocational environments.

This year, the RVA noted the limited curriculum options available for students with more significant needs. In reaction, the special education staff worked relentlessly to create the *Work Hard, Play Harder* curriculum. The program was implemented

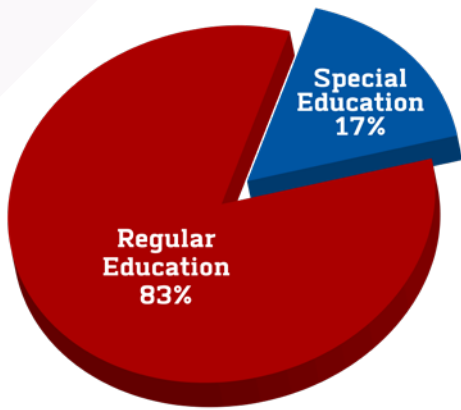
with four students during the 2021-22 school year. The *Work Hard, Play Harder* curriculum is a multi-sensory, developmental, and play-focused curriculum that is adaptable to meet the needs of students with a wide range of developmental levels. The curriculum exposes students



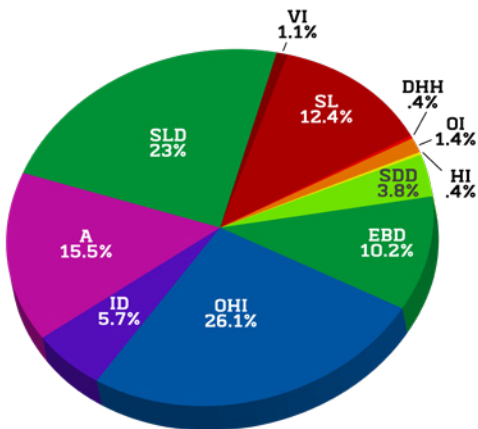

to a variety of pre-academic skills (ABCs, phonics, vocabulary, motor development, social-emotional learning, numbers, colors, shapes, etc). The curriculum is routine and predictable, yet fun and engaging. There are plans to develop multiple levels of the *Work Hard, Play Harder* curriculum in the coming years.

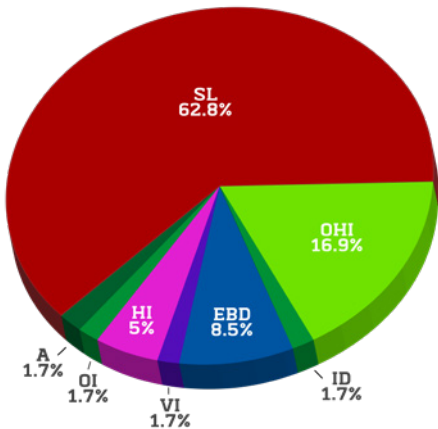
New and innovative ways of supporting students and families will continue to remain at the forefront of the RVA's special education team.

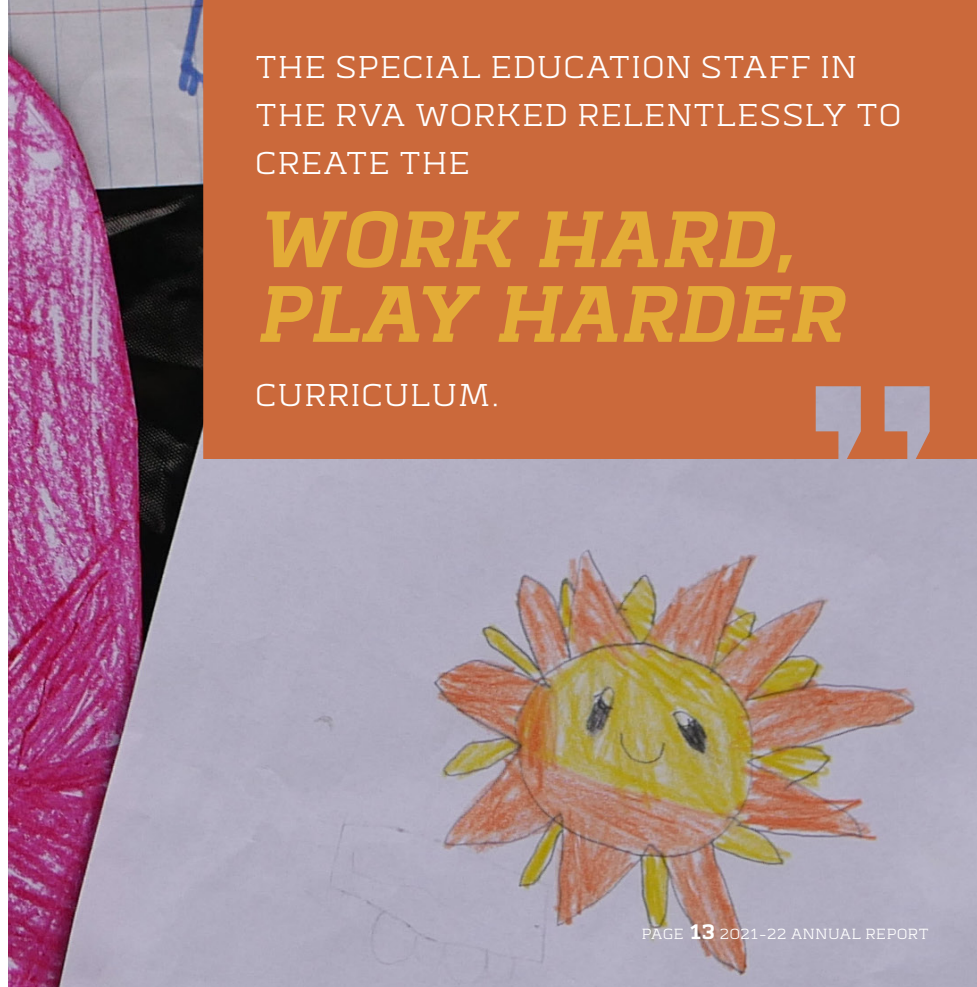

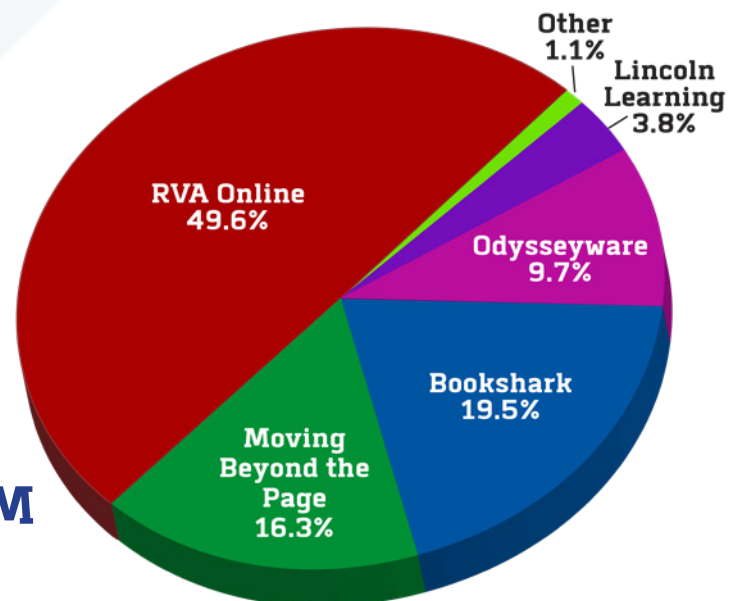
The RVA offers families wide-ranging options of curriculum choices from completely offline, to completely online, and options in between. All curriculum choices are secular and piloted prior to being adopted to ensure they meet the rigor and learning standards that meet or exceed those found in traditional school settings.

The RVA is not exclusively contracted with any particular vendor and is constantly looking for new and improved learning options for our students. In addition to individually piloting, negotiating prices, and adopting curriculum on its own, the RVA also partners with a large consortium called the Wisconsin eSchool Network. This network is comprised of school districts from around Wisconsin, in partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, who collectively vet and procure digital content from a variety of industry-leading vendors. The RVA is an Invested Member of the network and maintains a seat on the

Board of Directors. The network acts as a cooperative and because of the volume of purchases made, the RVA has access to the highest quality digital content found on the market at the lowest access prices. These cost savings are passed along to the RVA consortium and help keep overall per-pupil costs at some of the lowest found in virtual education. Additionally, cost savings in curriculum allows the RVA to expand our human capital ensuring that families are well supported in all areas of their child's education.

All curriculum options match Wisconsin State Academic Standards and teachers are provided ongoing professional development to ensure they can support parents and students in the delivery of daily lessons to fidelity.

The following chart shows the percentage of curriculum choices selected by parents in the RVA.

The academic performance of students can be measured in various ways including formative assessments gathered by reviewing daily work, summative assessments gathered periodically to measure incremental learning over the course of the year in any particular subject, and in the use of standardized measures such as state exams, progress monitoring probes, and placement tests. The following gives a brief description of each of these types of academic measures used by the RVA over the course of the 2021-22 school year.

Formative and Summative Subject Area Testing

Minimum subject area testing is required after the completion of a set number of daily lessons. Additional daily assessments may be required in the form of online writing, quizzes, and tests assigned by RVA teachers. The Home Mentor or other designated proctor must monitor the student while tests are being completed. Test results are returned to the student and scores are recorded by RVA teachers.

Performance-Based, Alternative & Other Authentic Assessments

Providing student choice to demonstrate mastery over their learning is one of the academic pillars of the RVA. We know that every child learns differently and if given the chance to use their strengths, a child will, more often than not, exceed academic expectations.

Standardized assessments focusing on memorization of facts, “true/false”, multiple-choice, and matching can only assess a person’s partial understanding of a topic and does not best allow a student to demonstrate connectivity to

previously mastered content. The use of authentic assessments not only provides students and families a unique way to demonstrate mastery, it also produces an authentic demonstration of learning to the teacher. We believe that students need to be able to articulate and express their thoughts through discussion, creation, and problem-solving. A child who is able to demonstrate their learning in ways that utilize their natural talents allows for that new learning to not only be mastered, but remembered.

In the 2021-22 school year, one of the school's goals was to focus on the number of authentic assessments being provided to students. In addition, we wanted our teachers to observe a variety of instructional practices that are being utilized in the virtual classroom by their colleagues. In any school setting, a teacher can be left to feel as if they are on an island during the school day. It is a rare opportunity for a teacher to be able to visit or observe one of their colleagues' classrooms in action and benefit from being exposed to new ideas. To encourage our teachers to make these observations in the RVA, we implemented a staff activity during the second quarter of this year called the "Tour de RVA Challenge." The goal was simply for teachers to visit other classrooms, and then reflect and share about one spotlight or takeaway from this visit. Participation in this challenge was optional, but proudly over 360 separate observations were conducted by teachers during this 45-day period of time. Teachers were eager to share their observations and highlight the successes and accomplishments witnessed during their classroom visits. A child who is engaged in their learning and who has a strong relationship with their teacher, tends to academically perform better than a student without those critical connections, and the ways that different teachers capture the attention of their students and build those relationships was the focus of the majority of teacher observations. At the conclusion of this activity, teachers

asked to have similar opportunities again in the future because of the positive collective benefit to everyone involved.

Standardized Testing

Students are required to take periodic standardized tests through providers determined by the RVA. These tests are used to determine proficiency and academic growth of the students participating in the Rural Virtual Academy. These tests provide near-immediate feedback and, in part, serve to facilitate the accountability requirement of the charter.

During the 2021-22 school year, the RVA required all new elementary students to take both the Diagnostic Online Reading Assessment (DORA) and Adaptive Diagnostic Assessment of Mathematics (ADAM). The DORA/ADAM tests are again offered in the Spring to measure growth for students in grades PreK-2. The RVA annually participates in state-mandated standardized examinations including the American College Test (ACT), ACT Aspire, Access, Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM), and Wisconsin Forward exams. Additionally, the RVA continues to utilize AIMSweb® and other products to assist in the progress monitoring of students using intervention curriculum to help determine if progress was being made. A pilot of FastBridge™ as a potential replacement for DORA/ADAM and AIMSweb® was conducted with the results proving to be not as valuable as current assessments.

Grade Advancement

RVA students receive grades on assignments similar to students enrolled in traditional schools. Some assignments are graded automatically within the course, some are graded by RVA teachers, and where relevant, the teachers provide feedback in the form of a grade or report. Students receive comments on completed work and periodic grade updates. Final grades are determined by averaging all the work for the year. Annual report cards are issued to all students in grades PreK-8. When in high

school, all grades appear on a formal transcript. The initial responsibility for deciding whether there is retention or advancement of a student rests with the teacher(s) primarily responsible for the child's education, the administrator overseeing the child's teacher, and the parent/legal guardian of the child. These provisions include but are not limited to academic achievement, intelligence, attendance, self-image, attitude, experiential background, and social/emotional maturity.

All students attending the RVA in 2021-22, who were not removed for lack of academic participation, have either successfully completed their grade level coursework or are completing coursework over the summer for promotion to the next grade level.

State Testing

The State of Wisconsin requires testing of all public education students in grades PreK-11. The tests take place in a specific time frame designated by the State of Wisconsin each year. In accordance with state law, it is required that state tests be administered by RVA teachers or other proctors assigned by the RVA Administration. The RVA teachers or assigned proctors must be present at all times while the tests are administered. These exams included: ACT, Wisconsin Forward, Access, Dynamic Learning Maps, and ACT Aspire. The Assessment of Reading

Readiness was offered to students in grades PreK-2 to be completed online from home. Some of the exams were given in the fall, while most were given in the spring, and others were given multiple times over the course of the year.

Of the 1291 students eligible to participate in state examinations, 983 (75%) were voluntarily opted out of testing by their parents. Of these students, 140 of them were 11th graders and were eligible to participate and complete the ACT examination with 74 students being opted out. Although not encouraged, these opt-outs are permitted by State of Wisconsin Statute 118.30 “Pupil Assessments” and RVA policy RVA-IL “Testing Program.”

An internal data review of the RVA’s 2022 ACT results shows that students who have been enrolled in the RVA High School (RVAHS) for two or more years demonstrate at or above the national average in the area of Reading. RVAHS students also improved their performance in the areas of Math and Science compared to 2021 results. Overall Wisconsin ACT scores for 2022 were not available at the time of this report, so it is difficult to determine how RVA students compare to others in the state at this time. The RVA is very proud of student Ben Ortengren for obtaining a perfect score of 36 on his ACT. This was the first perfect score by an RVA student on the ACT and is a very exceptional achievement, with only 0.33% of all students nationwide earning this score.

Results are available for public review for academic outcomes achieved on



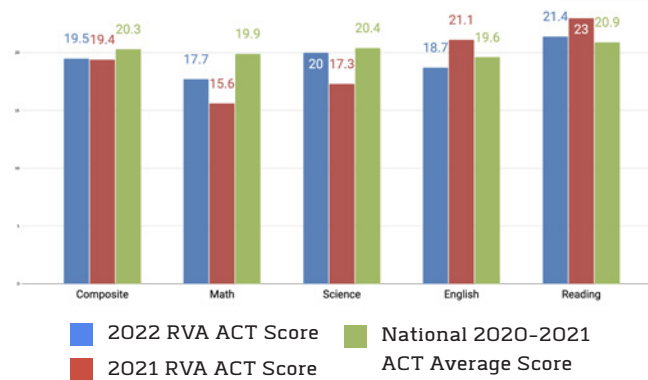

state-mandated standardized tests from the 2020-21 school year. The most recent results show the RVA “Meeting Expectations.” Each year, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction compiles the results and produces a “school report card” for the public to view the academic outcomes of students who participated in these exams. The RVA’s report card is a combined synopsis of those students who took the mandated exams from all of our consortium districts and open enrolled students. Taken in context, the results show the school meeting expectations for the students who participated, which was approximately half of those eligible. Due to the low participation rate, data representing growth in subgroup areas reported in the “Closing the Gap” are non-applicable. Other outcomes used in detailed reports including “School Growth,” “Student Engagement,” and “On-Track and Post-Secondary Readiness” only have limited data points. Additionally, since the majority of students participating in the examinations were open enrolled to the RVA, the overall scores do not reflect upon the results of the overall district score of the Medford Area Public School District or any of the other invested member districts.

Academic and Career Planning

The RVA believes that all students should graduate from high school ready to achieve their postsecondary goals, whether that be a career, college or the military. High school counselors and student services coordinators offer multiple Academic and Career Planning (ACP) activities throughout the year. Some examples of these activities include college application assistance, hosting a Financial Aid Night, and individual student planning conferences throughout the year. The high school counselors conducted presentations on Personality Styles, Exploring Career Factors, Getting Job Experience, Study Skills & Habits for

9th graders; Work Values; Careers and Lifestyle Costs; Workplace Skills & Attitudes; and Program Prospects for 10th graders; Choosing a College; Career Demands; Entrepreneurial Skills; Work/Life Balance; Career Backup Plans; Job Interviews; Defining Success; and Career Path Choices for 11th graders. Monthly guest speakers also presented to students on topics such as health careers, technical and industrial opportunities, computer careers and various other career clusters that have jobs in high demand fields.

Youth Apprenticeships & Work Experience

The 11th and 12th graders are able to participate in Youth Apprenticeship programs to gain hands-on experience in potential careers. Some students are also eligible to participate in local work experience opportunities. During the 2021-22 school year, 13 students participated in the Youth Apprenticeship program and 22 students participated in a work experience program.

In-Building Courses

RVA consortium students also have the opportunity to take courses in their resident school and open enrolled high school students are able to take courses in-building through part-time open enrollment. Many students who take advantage of this opportunity participate in courses such as band, choir, and technology education. During the 2021-22 school year, 64 students enrolled in 149 in-building courses. The RVA believes that by

allowing students to participate in these courses at their local school, it builds and strengthens positive relationships between families with students enrolled in the RVA and their resident schools and is a true benefit of our consortium partnerships.

Dual Credit Opportunities

The RVA provides high school students the opportunity to earn both high school and college credit at no cost to the student or family through multiple avenues. One route to earning college credit is through the RVA Live Dual Credit Courses. RVA teachers are trained and approved by Northcentral Technical College to teach college-level courses. The majority of the dual credit courses are highly transferable to technical colleges and four-year universities throughout Wisconsin. During the 2021-22 school year, 95 RVA students took advantage of the dual credit courses and earned 254 college credits, which saved over \$40,000 in tuition costs

During the 2021-22 school year, the following dual credit courses were offered:

- Introduction to Sociology
- Introduction to Psychology
- Cents & Sensibility
- Written Communication
- Oral & Interpersonal Communication
- College Algebra
- Applied Math
- Medical Terminology
- Body, Structure, Functions

Students can also earn college credit at no cost during high school through the Start College Now and Early

College Credit programs. Through these programs, students attend college courses either on the college campus or online and earn both high school and college credit for the courses they successfully complete.

OnCourse

For students who are credit deficient or have unique challenges, the RVA has developed the OnCourse program. OnCourse is dedicated to supporting the needs of an individual student and their academic pathway according to credits, personal needs, skills, and post-secondary goals. Students enrolled in the OnCourse program are assigned an OnCourse teacher who serves as their advocate, meets regularly with the student, and works with the students to develop individual learning plans with the goal to graduate with their peers. This year, the OnCourse program served a total of 42 students who were identified as credit deficient when entering the program. Sixteen of these students were seniors, with two seniors graduating at the end of 1st semester and 14 seniors successfully graduating at the end of the school year.

Graduation

In 2021-22, the RVA is planning on celebrating its fifth graduation class. All students eligible to graduate met or exceeded the full graduation requirements set forth by the State of Wisconsin Statute 118.33, our authorizer, the Medford Area Public School District Board of Education's graduation policy, all corresponding consortium Board of Education

policies, and all other expectations set-forth by the school. Students and families were again provided an option to participate in different commencement exercises. Consortium students were permitted to choose whether to walk in their community's local public school commencement exercise or in the ceremony hosted by the RVA on June 3rd at the Hilton Garden Inn in Rib Mountain. Students attending the RVA through open enrollment are permitted to walk in either the community public school commencement ceremony held in Medford, WI or participate in the RVA's ceremony.

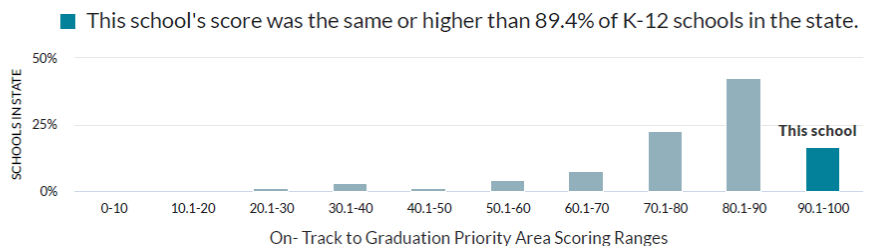
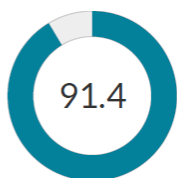

The RVA allows students who have completed three years of high school and have met all graduation requirements to graduate early. These students and their parents/guardians met with RVA administration for an Early Graduation Meeting to discuss their reasons for wanting to graduate early and to make sure that graduating early was in the best interest of the student. This school year, 20 of our 12th graders graduated at the end of 1st semester and 8 of our 11th graders will be graduating at the end of this school year.

Priority Area Score



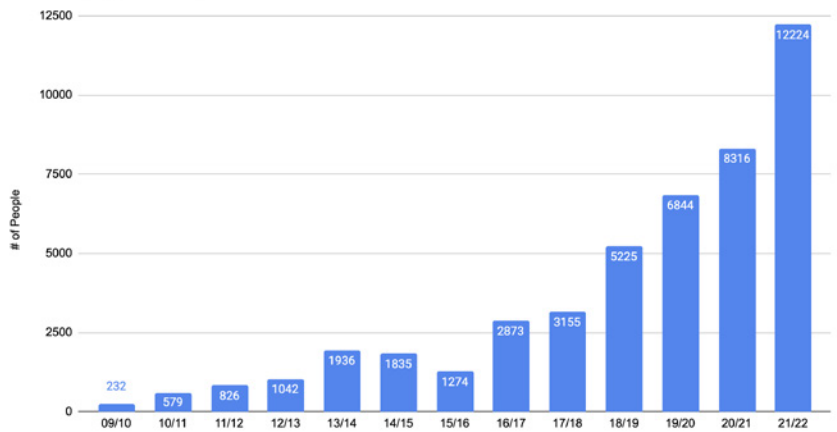

RVA Director of Activities, Josh Duwe, reported that during the 2021-22 school year, 154 events were provided to our RVA families by our Regional Event Coordinators. Throughout the year 12,224 participants, made up of just under 62% our RVA families, took part in these activities across the state. In addition to these regional events, RVA teachers provided access to 29 unique online clubs and activities including “Snow Days,” “LEGO Club,” “RVA’s Got Talent,” “Writer’s Block,” “Songwriters Club,” “Sign Language,” “Online Art,” “Story Club,” “Virtual Yoga,” and many more.

During the year, students also were able to take part in RVA music and theater programming with performances put on by the “RVA Show Stopper” theater group. Co-curricular opportunities including “RVA Weekly,” “RVA Random Acts of Kindness Club,” “Environmental Alliance,” “National Honor Society,” “GSA,” “Yearbook,” “eSports,” and “Student Council” also gave high school students personalized interactions and ways to connect outside of the school day. In total, activities and clubs equaled over 252 different activities for families and students to take part in throughout the school year. Additionally, our parent driven “RVA Mentor Series,” continues to grow with the development of the new Mentor Network, a collaborative group with a focus on the encouragement and support of RVA Home Mentors.

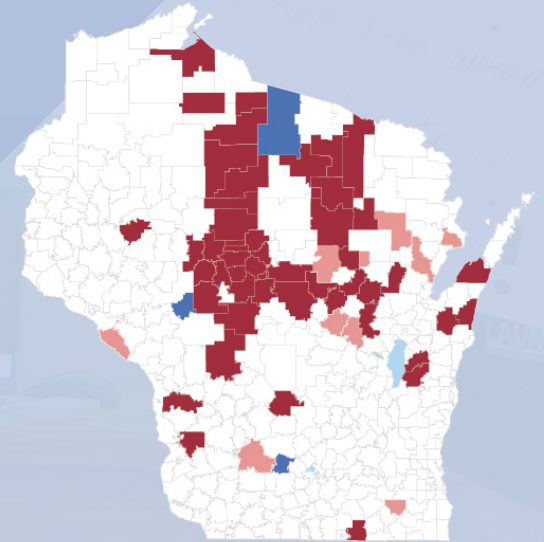

The RVA Consortium

The RVA's consortium continued to grow over the 2021-22 school year. Through the use of the State of Wisconsin Statute 66.0301, the RVA uses these cooperative agreements to share in educational partnerships with districts all throughout Wisconsin. Initially, all districts have the option to join the RVA for only a single year. Single-year members are considered "affiliate" members and are provided a reduced per enrollment cost, in comparison to open enrollment as well as access to digital curriculum to be used in traditional classrooms. Affiliate partnerships provided both the RVA and the new affiliate district a low-risk pathway to vet the partnership and shared services. After one year, affiliate members can choose to commit to a multi-year partnership.

Multi-year members are considered "invested" members. The invested districts are committed to supporting the operations of the RVA, both fiscally and through governance, for the length of the charter, which is a maximum of five years. These districts are subject to a formulary, where the end cost per pupil is determined by the

total revenue, less expenses, then divided by the total number of students attending. Additionally, these districts can hold a voting seat on the RVA Governance Board. Invested consortium partners also have access to digital content as well as professional development opportunities for teachers who wish to incorporate digital learning courses in their local school districts' traditional classrooms.



A total of 7 new affiliate partnerships were approved, along with the conversion of 11 current affiliated.

A total of 7 new affiliate partnerships were approved, along with the conversion of 11 current affiliated members to invested, beginning in the 2022-23 school year. Capacity has been added to allow the consortium to grow to approximately 65 school district members without jeopardizing the quality of support currently being provided to RVA partners. The RVA is committed to maintaining ongoing efforts to bring on future member districts throughout Wisconsin and beyond.

FULL-TIME VIRTUAL & SUPPLEMENTAL GROWTH TRENDS

The RVA serves not only full-time virtual enrollments, but also supports the growth of digital learning in the traditional classrooms throughout all the consortium districts' schools. The use of part-time, supplemental, and online courses in traditional classrooms is managed under the RVA's District Connect team. By offering both services, the RVA is able to provide partner districts greater leverage to support the increasing benefits digital learning brings to education. These benefits include cost savings over traditional textbooks, engaging content embedded with videos and interactive lessons, portable and flexible learning solutions, the most current information, and instantaneous feedback.



FULL-TIME VIRTUAL SCHOOL GROWTH

Using the most recent enrollment data available from the Department of Public Instruction’s public “WISEdash” portal, the RVA now ranks, out of 58, as the largest virtual school in Wisconsin. Further review of the Wisconsin virtual school landscape shows that 36% of the current virtual schools are new or growing, while the remaining 64% are declining or closing. Much of the recent decline can be attributed to the post-COVID return of students to traditional classroom settings, however, data seems to show that mature virtual schools, such as RVA, are actually continuing to increase in growth at rates equal to or greater than when COVID closures started. To date, RVA is one of only five that continue to operate as a consortium.





DIVERSIFYING IN 2021-2022

By virtue of partnering with the RVA, consortium partners can have access to the RVA's digital content, learning management systems, professional development, and administrative support services.

Diversifying District Connect

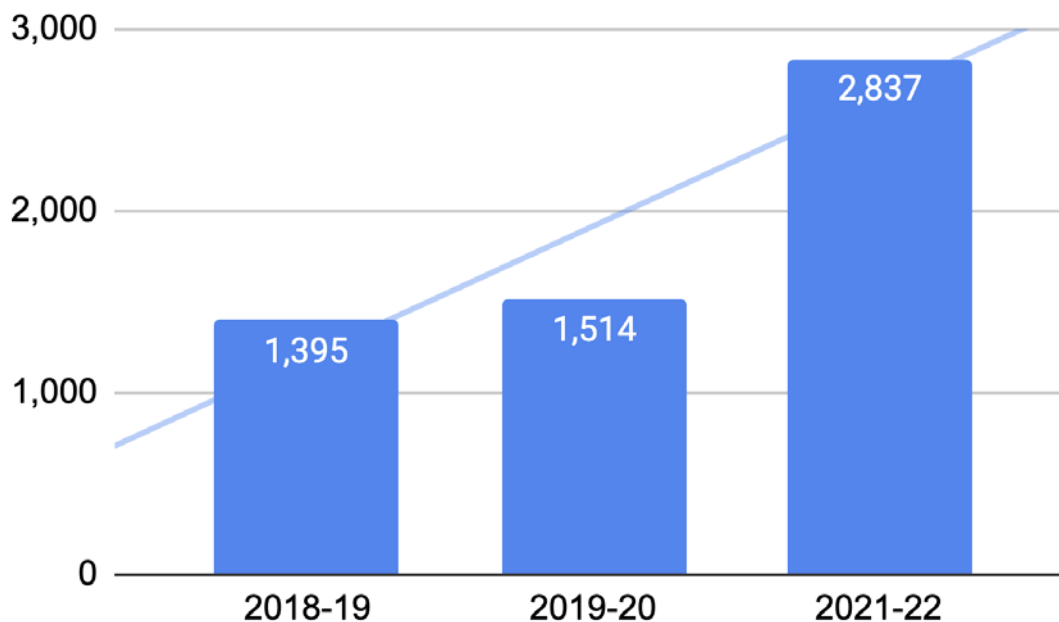
District Connect's goal is to serve as many Wisconsin students as possible with needed services, learning experiences and enrichment. Rapid growth in the consortium of district partners, has provided the opportunity to serve 2,833 students this year alone. This amounts to 5.18% of the students attending brick and mortar school each day in our partner districts. District Connect began with one main purpose: to share digital curriculum resources with partner districts so they are able to enjoy the many benefits of blended learning with minimal costs. As the years have progressed and the world of education has evolved, the team has identified additional areas of need in Wisconsin schools.

In 2021-22, District Connect adopted a variety of new services to meet those needs. Services available to districts include:

Exclusive Partnership - For districts with an existing full-time virtual school solution but needing access to other District Connect services.

Professional Development - The team has always provided comprehensive support and training for digital curriculum, but a concerted effort has been made to take PD to the next level by providing free offerings with access to nationally recognized speakers. RVA's District Connect has served 75% of the partner districts with some form of professional development. RVA's District Connect team has served 287 teachers throughout the partner districts.

English Learner (EL) Curriculum & Instruction - Beginning in the 2022-23 school year, RVA will be providing services for EL students in partner districts.

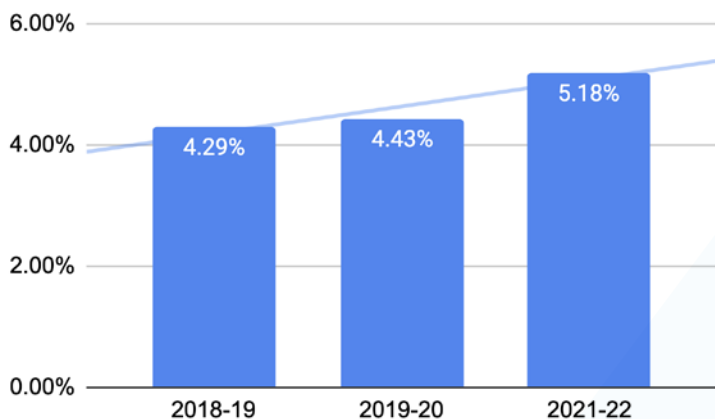
Gifted and Talented (GT)/Student Enrichment Activities - Students can participate in a variety of ways:

- Attending one of the single day workshops

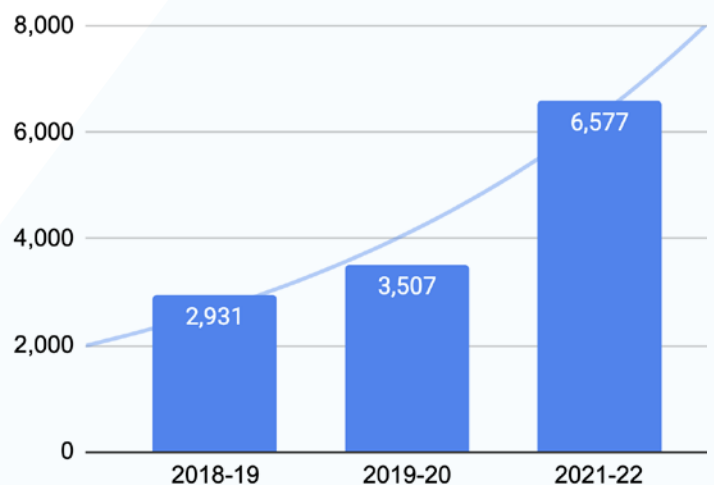

RVA’s team is continuously evaluating other options for supplemental curriculum and procuring them to provide additional core, elective and supplemental options for partner districts.

District Connect will always exist to serve partner districts and make their lives easier. Every decision made, curriculum purchased, professional development event offered is in service of this.

INBOUND & OUTBOUND **MARKETING**

The RVA's marketing efforts focus on two primary aspects in support of the school. First is outbound marketing, which comprises utilizing various forms of mass media to bring greater public awareness about the school to families throughout the State of Wisconsin. Secondly, the RVA's marketing efforts target inbound improvements that include improving efficiencies and user experiences for families who are enrolling or are already enrolled in the school.

According to RVA Director of Marketing, Athena Podolak, during the 2021-22 school year, "The RVA's marketing strategy resumed its normal outbound marketing efforts and increased frequency of email marketing campaigns, while targeting new consortium districts with OTT marketing. OTT is the delivery of our 30-second ads through video streaming which allows us to target our unskippable RVA Commercials to consortium district households with school-aged children and all Wisconsin households with school-aged children that had also researched educational services in the past. We served 449,396 ads throughout the state. We also created new branded materials, a mailable tri-fold brochure, and a co-branded social media graphic, to help consortium districts promote the RVA to those interested in virtual education in their districts."

This year, Marketing utilized the Mosinee Learning Center to both shoot new testimonials that became five new commercials, and to hold an in-person open house which was very successful. Families were able to look over curriculum options in person, ask questions, and watch the informational presentation from the administration on the big screen.

The school continued to focus on improving inbound marketing strategies with the development of our Customer Relationship Management software (CRM), for both the RVA's full-time side and District Connect. We plan to deploy the CRM during the 2022-23 school year.

Director Podolak notes, "With the development of the CRM, we will keep our families more informed during the curriculum and enrollment process. In addition, we will have an online service desk with a ticketing support system for our families to launch service requests for technical issues and other school-related concerns. On our District Connect side, districts requests will be tracked with their own internal ticketing system."

Every fall, the RVA surveys families and asks questions ranging from why they chose virtual education over homeschooling on their own, why they chose the RVA over other virtual schools, and for specific feedback regarding their experience through the enrollment process. The results of the 2021-22 Fall Survey led to numerous takeaways, which included:

Why parents chose the RVA:

- 51% of RVA families first heard of the school from word-of-mouth from a friend, 17% learned of the RVA from another district, a jump of 10% from the previous year
- RVA families continue to choose virtual education because they desired a more flexible schedule, an individualized educational approach, and they wanted to develop morals and character in their children as their top reasons
- 84% of RVA families chose virtual schooling over homeschooling on their own because they desired the support of dedicated teachers and staff, a variety of curriculum options, and were drawn to the large variety of field trips offered
- 10% of the respondents were completely new to virtual education, 15% came from other virtual schools

Areas the RVA was noted as doing well:

- The RVA improved on all facets surveyed especially in curriculum ordering and Zoom acceptance
- Districts did a great job informing their families interested in virtual to join us
- RVA teachers and staff were praised for their compassion, service, and availability

Areas the RVA was noted in need of improvement:

- RVA families wanted more communication throughout the enrollment process and wanted us to continue to vet new curriculum options

Actions taken based on feedback provided:

- The RVA wrapped up the initial development of the CRM to address communication dark periods through enrollment and in curriculum ordering with plans to deploy during the CRM in the 2022-23 school year

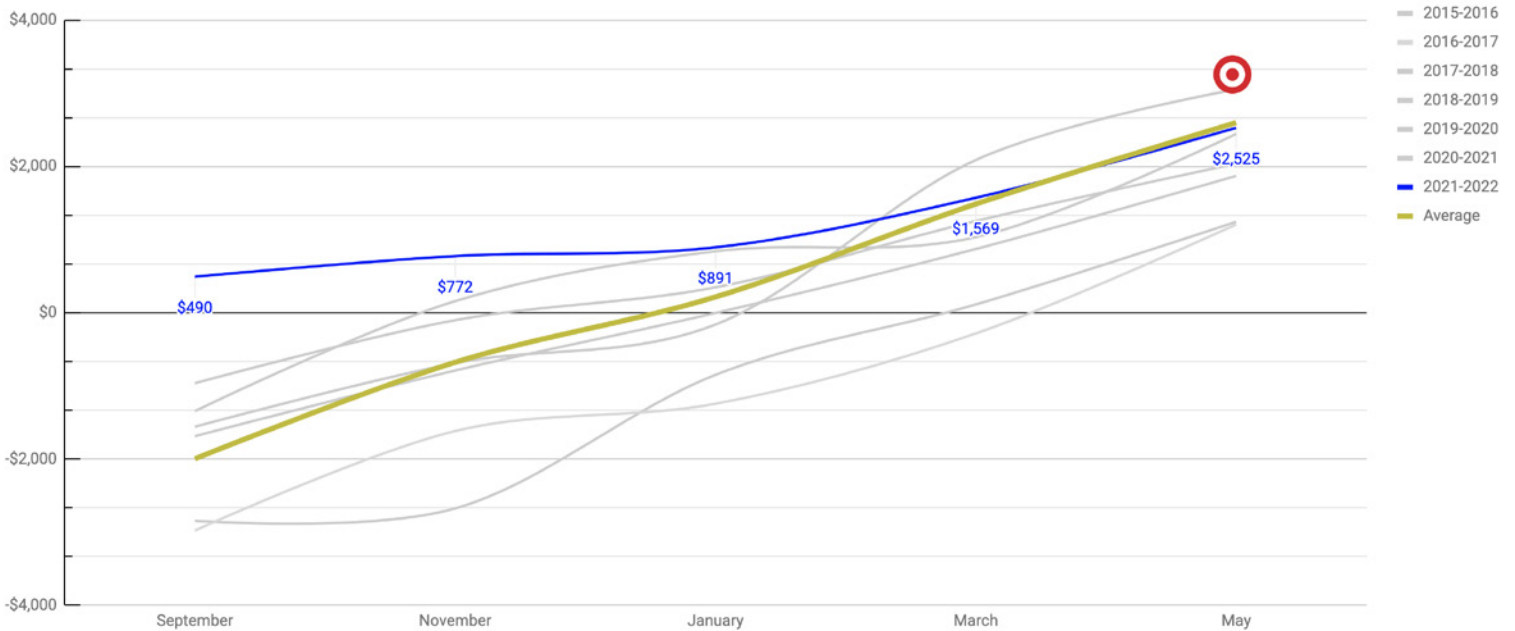

FINANCIALS

BUDGET & EXPENDITURES

During the 2021-22 school year, the RVA operated on a budget based upon having a total of 1,800 expected full-time enrollments. Full-time enrollment is calculated in different ways, depending upon the fiscal relationship the RVA has with the child's resident school district. Families enroll their children into the RVA through one of three different financial pathways: open enrollment, affiliated school district, or invested school district.

Because the RVA operates off of tax revenue, based on the total number of students it serves, when budgeting for all school operations, the total number of full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollments is calculated. Because three different financial enrollment pathways exist to generate per-pupil revenue based on the child's resident district we calculate revenues per student in three different ways.

First, for students who are attending the RVA under the state's open enrollment program, the total number of days students are enrolled in the RVA is calculated. This number is then divided by the maximum number of annual school days allowed by Wisconsin law which is 180. This calculation provides us with the total number of FTE open enrollments. In 2021-22, the total number of days attended was 160,522 bringing the total number of full-time equivalent open enrolled students to 891.79. This FTE is then multiplied by the per-pupil state aid allotment to provide an estimate of the amount of inter-district state aid revenue the RVA is expected to receive through open enrollment.

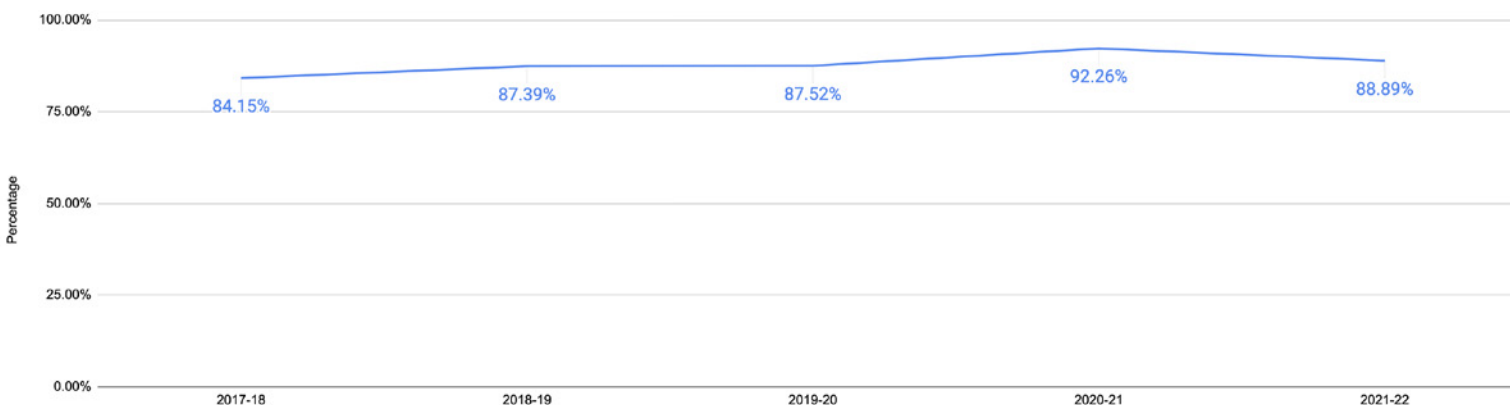
Second, the total number of days of attendance from students attending the RVA from affiliated member districts is calculated. The formula for calculating affiliate FTEs is nearly the same as for open enrollment students. This past year, the RVA had 18,273 days of attendance by affiliate students equating to an FTE of 101.52. Affiliate member districts receive a tuition reduction in comparison to the state's enrollment amount. Each affiliate member district has a different tuition rate negotiated with the RVA, but we can use

the FTE multiplied against individual affiliate member tuition rates to arrive at a revenue estimate.

Last, the total number of students enrolled from invested member districts is calculated. A student from an invested member district has his or her enrollment FTE prorated to the nearest quarter of the school year versus calculating per day. As an example, a student from an invested member district who attended the RVA from the beginning of the school year through the first semester (2 quarters) would be counted as a 0.5 FTE. A student who attended all year would be counted as 1.0 FTE. Preschool student enrollments are based on a full-time equivalency of 0.6 as determined by statute. In the 2021-22 school year the RVA had 773.31 FTE enrollments from its invested consortium districts.

The actual number of different students who attended the RVA during the 2021-22 school year was 1,960. At the end of the year, 1,755 students were active in the school at the end of the year. In total, the average number of FTE students attending the RVA during the 2021-22 school year was 1766.62. This was approximately 33.38 FTEs, or 1.8%, under the maximum number of students possible to be accounted for during the school year. In terms of revenue, the fact that significant pupil transitions out of the RVA occurred as COVID restrictions were lifted, combined with early graduates, and other factors which left a seat for a student open for a period of time, resulted in the RVA not capturing approximately 12% of potential maximum revenue from open enrolled pupil tuition. This loss in tuition revenue from open enrolled students was made up; however, is higher than anticipated enrollments from both affiliated and invested member districts, leading to overall budgets for both expected revenues and expenditures being very close to actual at year-end. Overall, full-time virtual school growth equated to a 20% increase in enrollments over the previous school year and almost exactly what was budgeted for in expected total revenues. Sum total of all expenditures came in 1% less than anticipated.

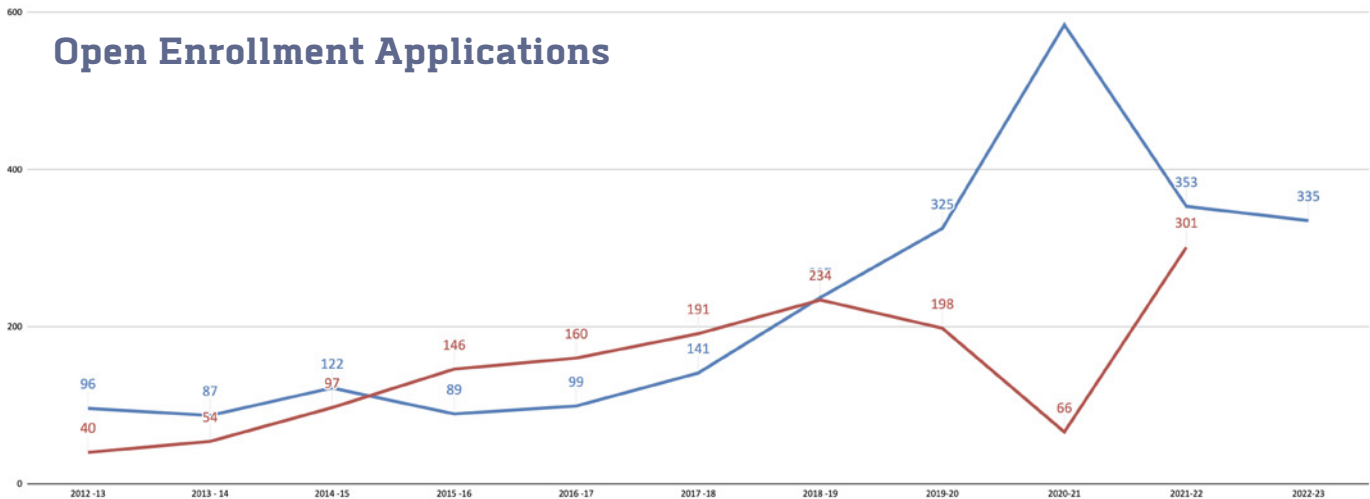
Percentage Open Enrollment Revenue: Actualized



OPEN ENROLLMENT

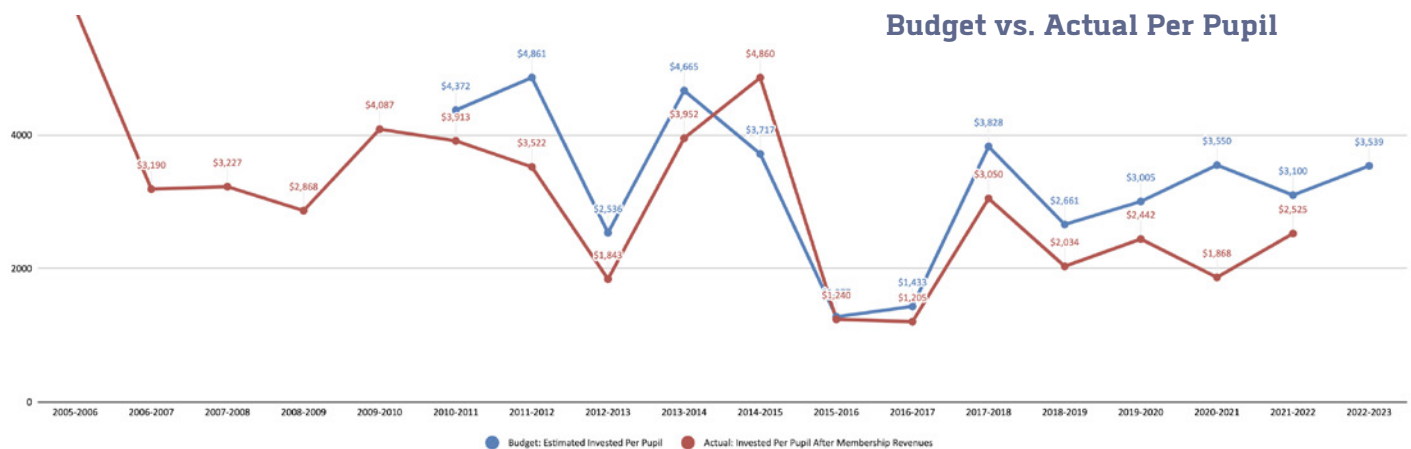
Through Wisconsin’s open enrollment laws, parents can select to send their child to any public school district they choose at any time of the year. Additionally, parents can annually select up to three different school districts to send their child to besides their resident district. Open enrollment has two pathways. The first is called the “regular” application process. The regular application process allows for parents during the months of February through April to file for open enrollment for the next school year. The second pathway is called the “alternate” application process. The alternate process allows for a family to open enroll out of their resident district at any time during the current school year for particular reasons.

Prior to the start of the 2020-21 school year, the RVA experienced growth from 325 to 584 families choosing to apply to attend the school for the following school year through the regular application process. This increase was attributed to the Department of Public Instruction extending the regular open enrollment application window through the month of May giving parents one additional month to decide on schooling options for their children during the COVID pandemic. A year later, interest from families wanting to open enroll into the RVA, during the Spring window, recessed to 353. For the upcoming 2022-23 school year, there were 335 spring open enrollment applicants. This number is back to what was experienced pre-pandemic, as in the 2019-20 school year, when the RVA received 325 spring applications.



PROJECTIONS & ACTUALS: Cost Per Pupil

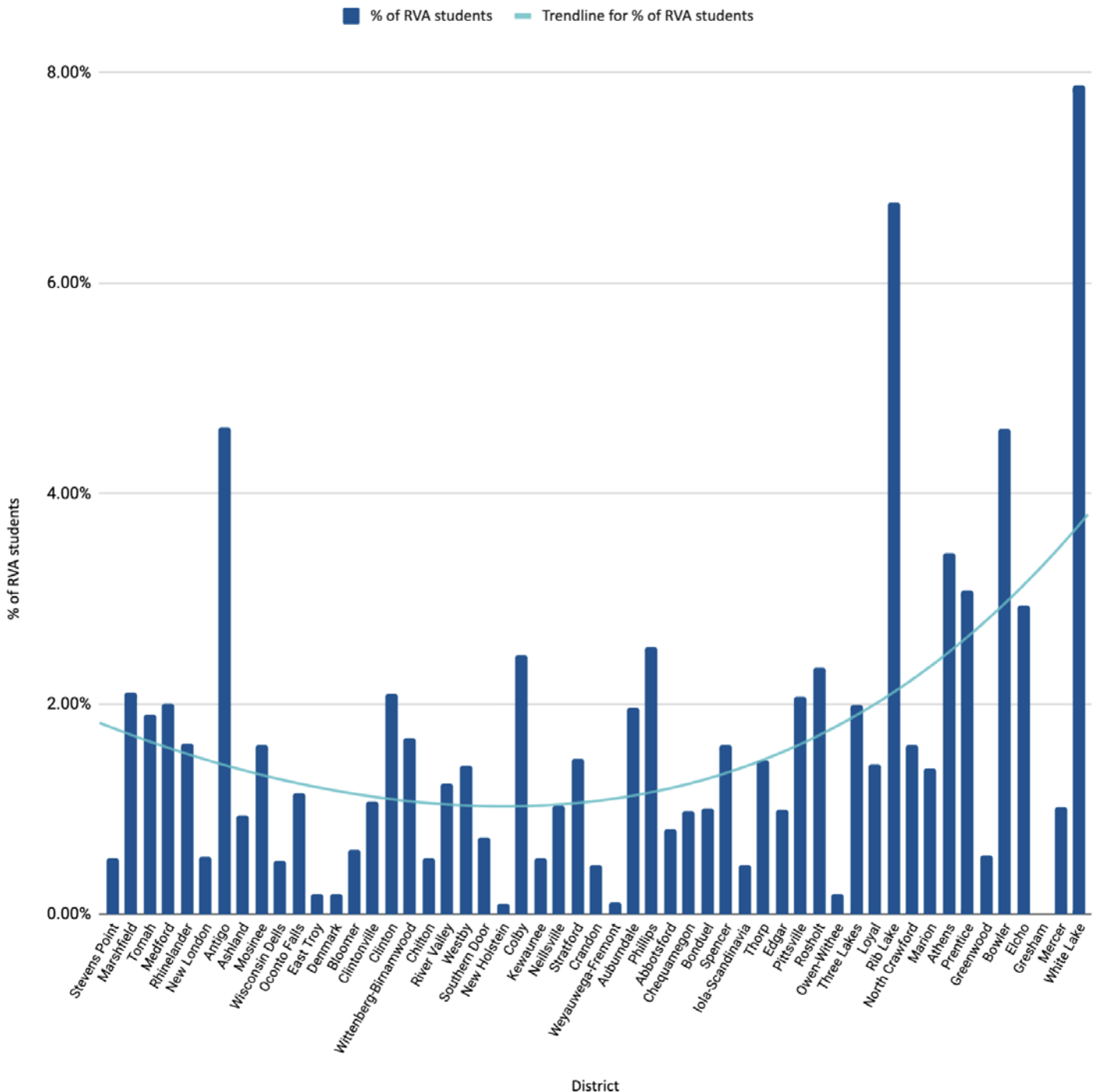
The RVA’s invested partners have experienced unprecedented economical per-pupil costs over the previous three fiscal years. The 2018-19 fiscal year brought the year-end per-pupil cost to invested member districts to \$2,034. This was followed by only a marginal increase to \$2,442 per pupil at the end of this 2019-20 fiscal year. This past school year, the invested tuition rate rose to \$2,525 per pupil. The historical 17-year combined average per-pupil cost for full-time virtual school services to invested member districts is \$2,596, with the seven-year look back average coming to \$2,052. Casting forward, the per-pupil amount per invested member district is expected to increase. This forecasted increase is due to needing additional staff and other value-added additions to the school with 2022-23 year-end projections estimated to be approximately \$3,539. This estimate is above the historical average, but represents a realistic impact considering the amount of teaching and support staff capacity being added to the school.



CONSORTIUM ENROLLMENT

Parents who reside within one of the RVA's consortium districts have the opportunity to enroll in the RVA as a local school choice. During the 2021-22 school year, nearly half (49.4%) of the RVA's full-time virtual school was made up of students who enrolled from a consortium school district with the remaining half (50.6%) attending through open enrollment. A look forward to the 2022-23 school shows consortium enrollment interest exceeding spring open enrollments by 105 applicants. With a total of 440 applicants, consortium interest has exceeded open enrollment and demonstrates the local support communities, parents, and school districts have in this partnership model. Applicants from the consortium are reviewed for acceptance under the same criteria as students who open enroll.

2022-23 RVA BUDGET

The 2022-23 budget reflects a conservative estimate of 30% growth based on historical averages. This budget supports approximately 2,100 full-time students and an additional approximate 8,000 part-time District Connect enrollments.

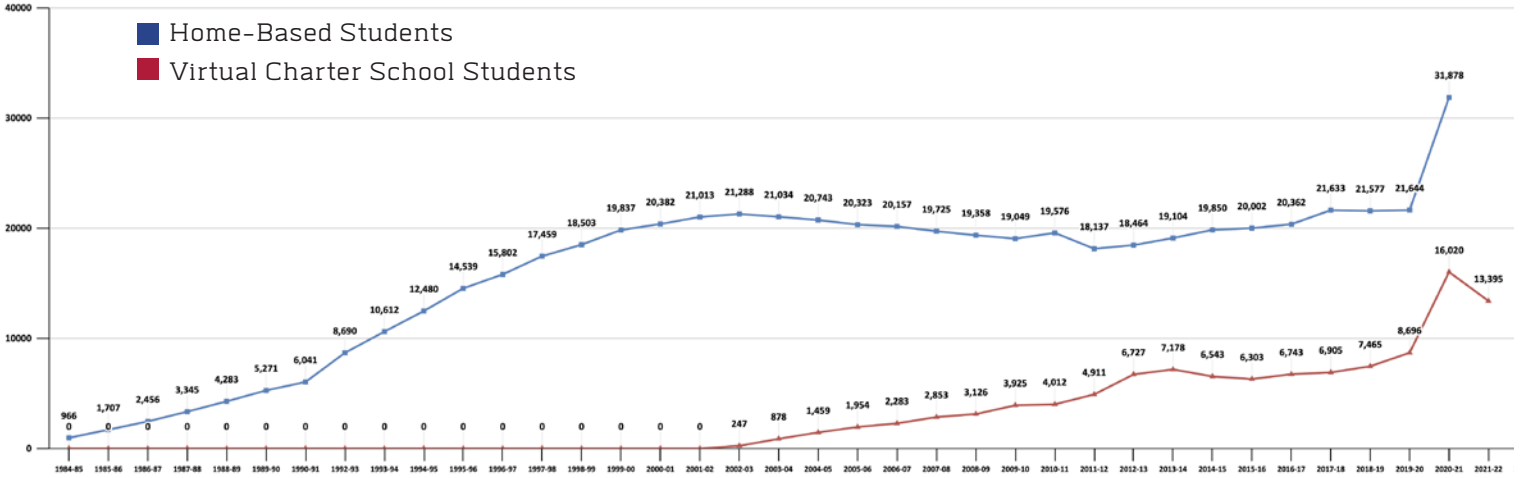
Looking forward to 2022-23, it is the consensus of our consortium partners, RVA leadership, and entire staff that we need to continue to scale up to meet the growing demand of parents seeking flexible learning options found in the RVA. Coming out of a pandemic has left school districts facing the fact that many parents are seeking permanent virtual schooling options. Many parents have found that this form of education is a good fit for their family. As a result, we continue to be contacted by school districts from around Wisconsin looking to become part of this consortium. Most districts we meet with are fiscally challenged and ill-equipped to be able to provide both a high-quality traditional and virtual learning option for their resident families. Because of this, most districts who contact us are looking for a turn-key, high-quality, low-cost solution. Although the RVA is poised to take on this challenge, we have decided it is not in the RVA's best interest to grow too fast and jeopardize the quality of educational opportunities for either families or districts. As a result, we have asked for enrollment caps to remain in place by both the RVA Governance and Medford School Boards, each in agreement. Unfortunately, we know, however, we know that enrollment caps keep families from being able to gain access to the RVA resulting in families choosing enrollment options outside of our consortium.

Therefore, the 2022-23 budget supports an approximate 30% spending increase over the previous year, allowing the RVA to grow again to partially meet enrollment demands. This is a conservative estimate that takes into account continual openings of new virtual charters and potential market saturation limits. It is believed to be prudent to protect quality and maintain realistic growth objectives to ensure the future longevity of the school. This budget provides for an end-of-year per-pupil amount targeted to be approximately \$3,539. It is important to remember that this prediction is only a budgetary estimate. In preparation for growing 30% in the 2022-23 school year, the RVA is hiring approximately 25 new full-time staff members. The targeted per-pupil amount is higher than the historical average due to the significant increase in staffing. Using historical data as a reference, the RVA has experienced above-average per-pupil costs in years when staffing additions were the highest due to the caseloads of those teachers not being fully maximized in year one. Historically, it should also be recognized that the lowest per-pupil costs have resulted in years two and three after large investments in staffing capacity.

VIRTUAL SCHOOL & HOME-BASED ENROLLMENT

Another key indicator of predicted growth can be found in comparing the number of Wisconsin private home-based education students against those enrollments in public virtual charter schools. A significant portion of students enrolling in the RVA come from previously attending a private home-based school program. When excluding years of public school closures due to the COVID pandemic, analysis of this data shows both Wisconsin's private home-based, as well as public virtual school enrollments, continue to increase.

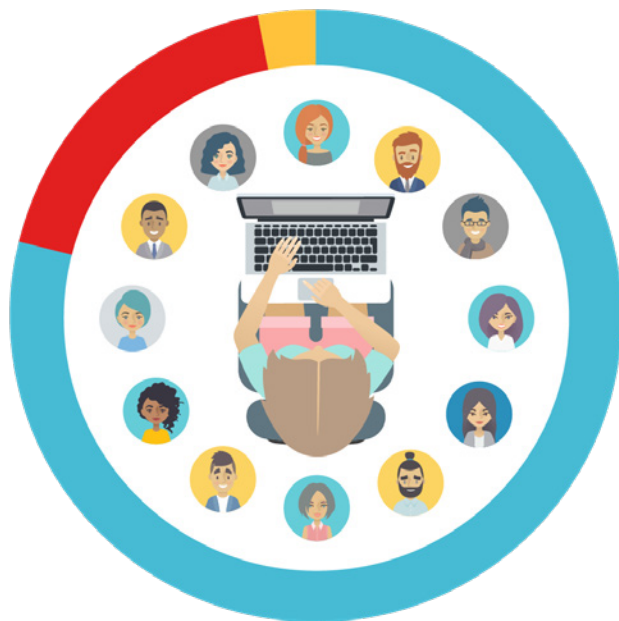

The RVA operates as a well-oiled machine! I am in awe over the well-rounded experience (s)that the RVA provides.

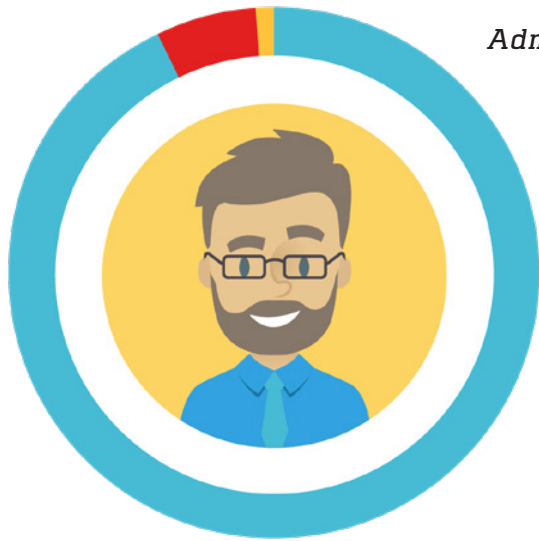
Being a first year RVA family I was very impressed with the school as a whole. I will definitely recommend RVA to other families.

I think most of my teachers did a good job helping me when I had a question and they made sure it got answered before moving on

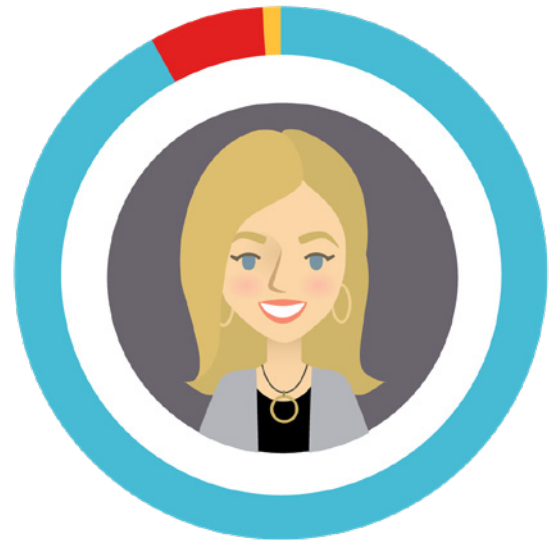

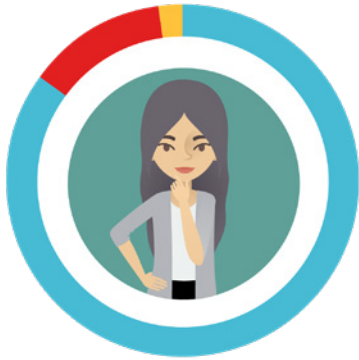

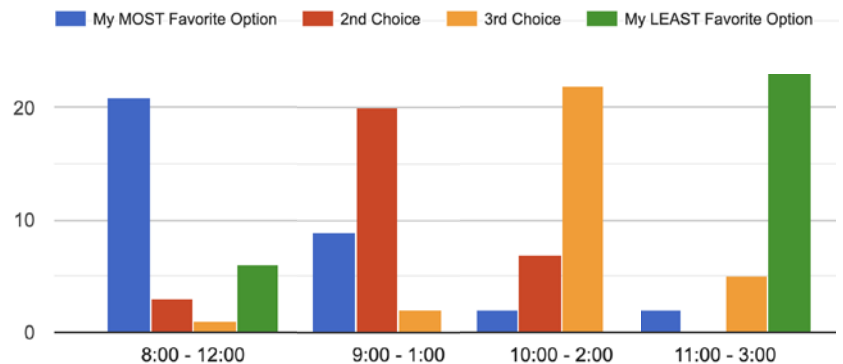

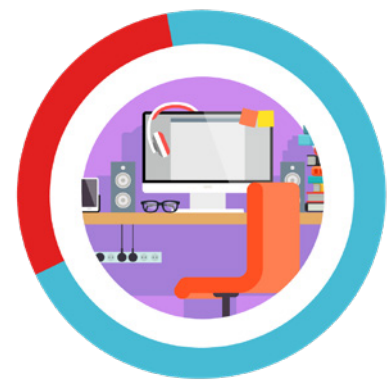

When asked, "Do you have any suggestions on how we could improve the student experience in live daily instruction classes?" these were the responses:

- In our live online courses the teacher had the students 'visit' then taught the lesson and ended class. It would prove to be more beneficial for more than just my student if the lesson was taught first and then during 'work' time the students could ask questions openly or 'visit' as they did their assignment. Then he would not have to go to class AND have to watch the recordings of half the classes, it gets very frustrating for him.
- One of my requirements for my kids is to have the camera on. It helps the 'classroom' feel.
- Learn to control the chat better. Many classes are completely ruined by kids goofing in the chat.
- Tell the teachers to slow down. I have 4 children that have done live classes and they all say the teachers go to fast.
- More engagement and interaction among students
- More chances for students to interact with each other and learn about it each other. (We understand that is challenging to do online)
- My middle schooler did all her main courses as book-based, and only took live classes for electives. She struggled in her live class using Buzz. I would suggest encouraging/requiring middle schoolers and parents to watch a buzz introductory video at the beginning of the semester, especially if the only Live classes they take are electives. I think the teachers expect the kids to know how to use Buzz (especially since it was a 2nd semester elective).
- My kids are very distracted by the chat box and miss a lot of teacher instructions. I think it would be nice if the focus of live classes was more on the "live instruction" and not on socializing, chatting, etc. maybe private chat only with teacher until last 5 minutes of class for socializing.

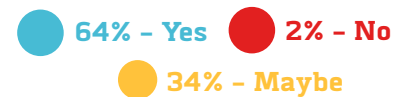

Somewhere she could do certain aspects of science or stem type classes in person.

I'd like to have more field trips that are spread out. The closest field trip to me was almost 2 hours away. I'd love to be able to go on field trips, make friends, and meet students/teachers in person, but it's hard when the field trips are so far away.

I also believe the learning centers could provide really unique learning opportunities. However, to maintain multiple properties costs a lot of money in overhead. It takes money to sustain any organization. So, if revenue is decreasing, what will be cut? Will students' curriculum options be limited and increased pressure to take live classes (which cost less) be the focus? Or will there be less field trips? ***** seems to be a very wise, level-headed, and fiscally responsible leader, so I try not to agonize too much about the financial future of the RVA. My desire is for the RVA to continue providing outstanding educational opportunities for all my kids and other students in Wisconsin for decades to come!
